Chaplain's Corner: Haven of Rest

On August 23 of this year, Virginia was stuck by a 5.8 magnitude earthquake centered in Mineral, Virginia, about 90 miles southwest of Washington D.C. Earthquakes of any kind are rare in the area, so it occasioned quite a reaction. It was felt strongly in much of central Virginia and southern Maryland and noted throughout the eastern US from central Georgia to central Maine and west to Detroit, Michigan and Chicago, Illinois, as well as in many parts of southeastern Canada from Montreal to Windsor. Widespread damage occurred from central Virginia to southern Maryland including the Washington D.C. area, including catastrophic damage to local schools near the epicenter and significant damage to the Washington Cathedral in NW Washington, DC.

There is some debate about the safest place to be in an earthquake (besides space). An earthquake engineer (someone who engineers earthquakes?) had this opinion:

The best place is wherever you can get temporary cover from falling objects, and then get out of the structure into an open area where there's nothing overhead. When we engineers perform earthquake reconnaissance missions to study damage effects from earthquakes, rescue/recovery teams we work with often find most of the dead bodies under desks, tables, chairs, etc. The lesson to be learned: a desk or table won't protect you from a collapsing ceiling or wall.

A couple of people opined that the best place to be was in the air, although some voted for hot air balloons over aircraft since runways might be damaged during a 'quake. My vote, though, is for an airplane. Some of this might come from watching too many apocalyptic movies in which an airplane takes off just ahead of an earthquake, flood, fire or attack by aliens. *Independence Day* showed Air Force One outrunning a shock wave and fire from a huge explosion... Right. There's a spiritual side to all these considerations. One is that God is constant in the way the universe is set up. I personally do not think God sends earthquakes and other natural disasters to punish people (I know some would disagree): they are natural occurrences in our fallen world. The same conditions and forces that produce earthquakes are as reliable in their nature as conditions and forces that enable us to fly: we have air at certain pressure to move through, and we have the forces of lift, thrust, drag and weight to enable controlled flight. Forces like Bernoulli's Principle are part of God's design for the universe.

Secondly, true safety is never to be found in the creations of humankind, but in the care of the Father. Whether we are earthbound during a disaster or flying high above it, or in our ordinary daily walk, we believers are held safe and secure in the arms of God. Praise God for His mighty power and care for the people of God! Amen.

I had flown into Green Bay, Wisconsin on Saturday and met Jeff and Neale Sunday afternoon which was the EAA officially orchestrated "set up" day. The three of us had the booth fully assembled and functional in 60 minutes and by the 61st minute we had signed up our first new member...another exhibitor who felt compelled to stop by to see what Pilots for Christ was all about and then plunked down \$35 to join.

Foot traffic through exhibit Building D on opening day (Monday) was heady. The PCI-MN team made it a habit to keep track of the head count and other vital statistics for planning future events.

We were blessed to have Tim and Lori Layne help in staffing the booth. Tim and Lori flew in from Michigan to Green Bay on Thursday afternoon. It was an incredible encouragement to watch Tim and Lori click into action so enthusiastically upon their arrival at the booth on Friday. Their service over Friday and Saturday was tremendous and their witness for Christ was inspiring. It was difficult to get them to take a break during their days at the booth so passionate were they for the Lord and for the Pilots for Christ mission. The entire grounds was abuzz with fork trucks, dollies, wheel burrows and foot traffic all like busy ants deserting their nest.

There was a little irony the next day, Monday August 1st as we all traveled back home from Oshkosh to the twin cities. Neale and Jeff driving over the road beat me home in about 6 hours while I had to land along the way at Eau Claire, Wisconsin (KEAU) to sit out massive thunderstorms blocking the way to the west. The flight from Green Bay to home base Airlake (KLVN) usually takes 2 hours and 14 minutes. I had company in the FBO which hosted 6 other weary AirVenture show goers who were each trying to wing their way back home. About 7:00pm the sky cleared enough to be safe and we all departed together heading west each peeling off to his/her own destination.
